History

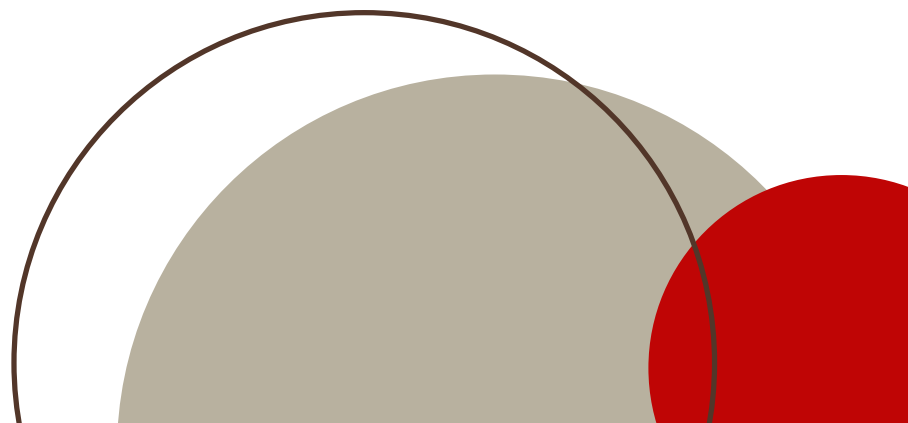
The Harriet W. Sheridan Center for Teaching and Learning was founded in 1987 to establish an interdisciplinary forum dedicated to improving the quality of teaching and learning at Brown and to prepare graduate students for faculty careers. Over the next 30 years, the center's mandate expanded to include faculty and postdoctoral instructors. In 2016, the mission grew to serve undergraduates as teachers and learners, including writing, academic tutoring, and English language support. Building on the Writing Fellows program, a nationally recognized peer-to-peer model founded in 1982, the Center established the Problem-Solving Fellows program in 2018 and, in collaboration with the Data Science Institute, the Data Science Fellows in 2019. In August 2020, the scope of Sheridan's work expanded further when it moved into the Office of the Provost and integrated with Digital Learning & Design (DLD).

Through an analysis conducted with a Brown UTRA student, we found that a majority (58%) of faculty interacted with the Sheridan Center over the course of six years (2016-2023); of these, **most (71%) engage with us more than once; and about a quarter (24%) interact six or more times.**

Strategic Plan Initiatives, 2023-24

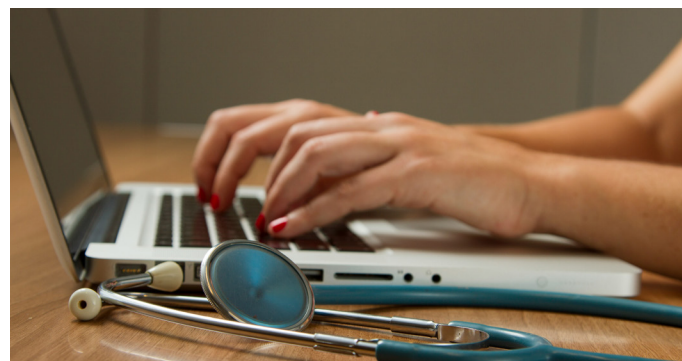
The Sheridan Center is an engine of teaching innovation at the heart of Brown's Open Curriculum. The Center's strategic plan expands opportunities for developing faculty engagement, student leadership, and ongoing curricular change. In Fall 2021, President Paxson and former Provost Richard Locke approved Sheridan's five-year plan, which is available at sheridan.brown.edu/about. Below, we detail key accomplishments in the third year of this plan.

GOAL 1: Promote innovation and remove friction to new learning modalities, particularly digital and expanded experiential learning.

In its first year as a member of the CIRTL (Center for the Integration of Research, Teaching and Learning) Network, Brown University graduate students and postdocs gained access to a wide range of resources, including professional development programs, teaching workshops, and learning communities dedicated to improving undergraduate education. CIRTL is a consortium of research universities dedicated to advancing inclusive education by preparing future faculty and promoting the use of evidence-based teaching practices.



The Sheridan Center expanded its support for the university's strategic priority of growth in its online master's and non-credit programs with additional staff and resources. Sheridan supported the development of courses in the Master of Public Health, Master of Healthcare Leadership, and Master of Science and Technology Leadership programs, as well as non-credit and executive programs.



Sheridan developed teaching and learning resources on the topic of artificial intelligence (AI), such as collaborating with the Library to create a Canvas Commons module on "Writing and Citing Critically: An AI Guide for Informed Students"; and offering a program on "Designing Creative Assessments in the Age of AI."



In collaboration with the Office of the Provost, the Sheridan Center provided course development funding and expertise to support a total of 171 'remote-accessible' (REM) courses in 2023-24 (courses that officially allow students who are not physically present to enroll and achieve the same learning objectives throughout the full term).



GOAL 2: Advance the university's strategic aims around diversity, equity, and inclusion.

In response to recommendations made by the university's Task Force on Anti-Black Racism, the Sheridan Center developed a new Bridge Scholars Program for incoming first-generation students at Brown. The six-week hybrid pilot in Summer 2024 offers scholars an opportunity to experience the academic, social, and co-curricular life at Brown before the fall semester begins. Scholars earn academic credit and the program fosters a supportive peer community, connections with faculty and staff, and familiarity with campus resources.



In support of the Graduate School's work, Sheridan offered multiple programs on the topic of rubrics to help guide departments on the development of concrete admissions criteria, in light of the Supreme Court decision on affirmative action.



The Sheridan Center organized a 'Difficult Conversations' series co-facilitated by a range of Brown faculty and administrators who shared their insights on how to foster dialogue regarding challenging topics in the classroom. We also offered an online asynchronous module on "Having Difficult Conversations Online" and a workshop on how to help students have difficult conversations.

GOAL 3: Maintain course development initiatives while increasing support for curricular development.

Sheridan's new Equitable Learning Inquiry (ELI) Program, with funding provided by the Davis Educational Foundation, provides resources and support to help faculty members investigate the extent to which student experiences and outcomes in foundational courses are equitable for students from different backgrounds and identity groups that have been historically underrepresented.



GOAL 4: After a rapid period of growth and integration, focus on Sheridan Center organizational identity.

The Sheridan Center launched a new website (sheridan.brown.edu) in June that is designed to provide greater clarity for faculty, students, and staff as they seek out our programs, services, and resources.



We developed communication tools to better provide an overview of the comprehensive programs and services we offer for faculty, graduate students, and undergraduate students.



Sheridan University-Wide Events, 2023-24

From June 1, 2023, to May 31, 2024, the Sheridan Center offered nearly 200 programs and events for Brown's teaching and learning communities. These initiatives drew over 2,200 attendees (N=2,257), and the aggregate mean evaluation of them was 4.9 (response to statement, "Overall, this is an effective program," with a scale of 1=Strongly disagree and 5=Strongly agree).

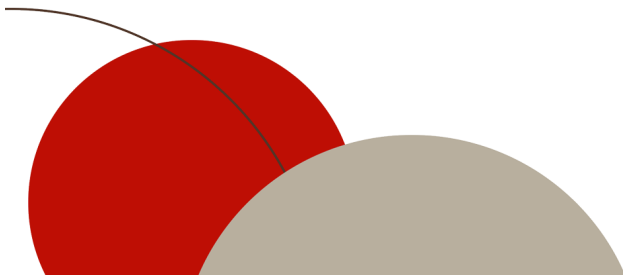

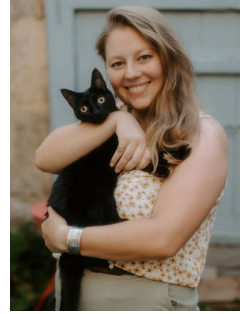

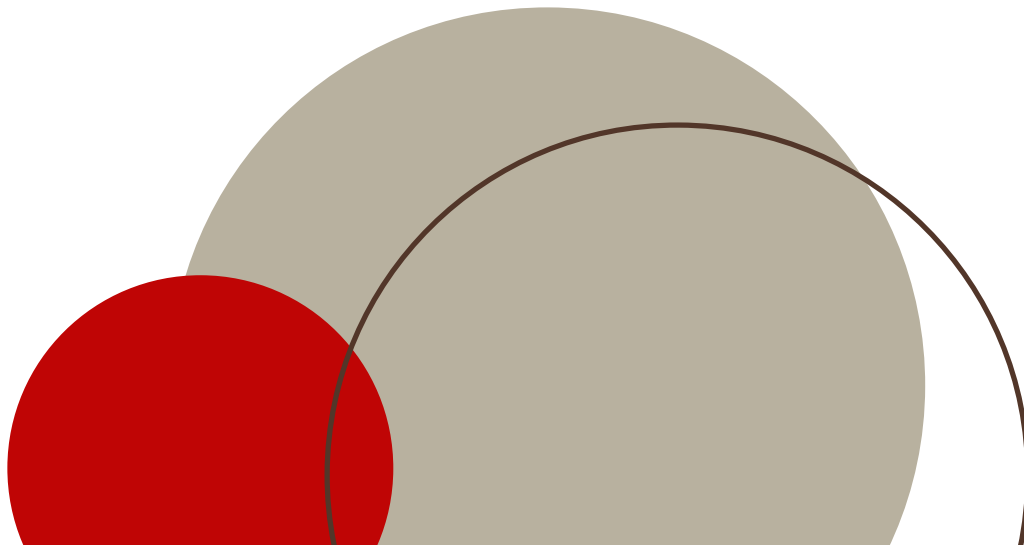
